

PSALM 23

- When reading Psalm 23, it's easy to somehow in our minds, separate the peaceful green meadows from the valley of the shadow of the death.
- It's as if we imagine these to be two separate paths
- But what if they're one and the same place?
- What if the peaceful green meadows are actually within the valley of the shadow of death?
- Verse 5 says that God prepares a feast table for us, **in the presence of our enemy, not separate from our enemy.**
- What does this mean for a child of God?
- It means that we're going to encounter major difficulties, **within the very midst** of God's provision and promises being fulfilled.
- Think about that for a moment and let it sink in: **encountering difficulties, within God's provision.**
- It's then that we need to remind ourselves of the truths of verses 1-3 of this Psalm
- No matter what happens, God's purpose is to bring honour to His name: vs 3
- Not just honour so He can be famous, but so that we can see Him as the loving Father that He is.
- The promises of vs 6 are conditional, just like all the other promises of God

HEBREWS 3:7,15 (NLTSE) Today you must listen to My voice

PROVERBS 1:33(NLTSE) But all who listen to me will live in peace, untroubled by fear of harm.

- What are one of the things a Christian is guaranteed:

JOHN 16:33(NLTSE) I have told you all this so that you may have peace in Me. Here on earth **you will have many trials and sorrows.** But take heart, because I have overcome the world

- Jesus will have to be our **everything**, if we're to overcome **anything**

JOHN 15:4(NLTSE) Remain in Me, and I will remain in you. For a branch cannot produce fruit if it is severed from the vine, and you cannot be fruitful unless you remain in Me
